Message from the research team – recruiting

Welcome to the third edition of our CARDIOPHITNESS study newsletter.

5th August 2019 marks exactly 6 months since we officially got all the necessary ethics approvals for the research study and launched the study.

Thank you for embarking on this journey with us. We'd like to take the opportunity to reflect and highlight some of the major milestones we've reached together. In this short period we have recruited 50 individuals who have taken part in this research. This has included service users who have been given a diagnosis of a severe mental illness (e.g. schizophrenia), carers and care professionals (nurses, doctors, pharmacists, occupational therapists, support workers). We would like to thank all those who have taken part for their time and effort.

Although we haven't reviewed and analysed all the information we have gathered as part of the study we can already see some important and key points:

The perception of pharmacists and services that pharmacy can provide is influenced by several factors including

- Visibility and presence e.g. on inpatient wards
- Quality of relationships e.g. with service users

Support and care for physical health

- Needs to take into account individual needs of service users
- Be structured rather than generic
- Long term

Information about side effects of medication such as antipsychotics

- Most service users and carers reported receiving little or no information about side effects of these medicines
- When information was received it was not supported with verbal advice or signposting for support.

.....are twice as likely to have type 2 diabetes

.....are nearly three times more likely to smoke
