








Welcome to the 12th issue of 'food for thought', your distraction pack.

**CORONAVIRUS (COVID-19)** 

Registering with a GP during COVID-19

### What is a GP?

 A General Practitioner (GP) or a 'family doctor' is a doctor based in the community

#### What does a GP do?

- GPs can treat minor issues
- · Identify any more serious health issues
- Refer you for further treatment to a hospital or other specialist health service

## Who can register?

- Anyone in England may register and see a GP for free
- You do not need a fixed address
- Your immigration status does not matter
- You do not need identification, documentation or an NHS number

\*Sometimes GP practices ask for identification or documentation. If you are asked for documentation or identification, and you do not have any, explain that you are currently homeless, and they should still register you.

\*If the GP cannot support you to manage your condition, they will refer you to a specialist \*If your condition is an emergency go to Accident and Emergency

## COVID-19 and registering

- Most GP surgeries are closed due to COVID-19, however some are doing phone and online appointments
- Registration has moved on-line or over the phone
- If you are having difficulties registering, ask a support worker or advocacy worker for help.

If you are unable to access a GP and have an urgent medical problem, please ring 111 or go to an Accident and Emergency department.

## What services are provided at my GP?

Your GP will be able to help you with:

- Physical health problems, including minor illnesses, minor injuries and the management of all ongoing more serious health problems
- Mental health issues
- Substance misuse issues
- Preventative care e.g. health screening and vaccinations (see other leaflet)
- Wound dressings
- Support with your pregnancy
- Contraception and sexual health
- Referral to termination of pregnancy services (If you prefer not to attend your GP for this you can alternatively call 0333 999 9951)

## COVID-19 symptoms

Call 111 and self-isolate until further advice if you have any of the following symptoms.

- · Fevers or sweats
- A persistent cough
- Shortness of breath
- A loss of sense of smell or taste



If you cannot manage your symptoms you should go to A&E.

# Using the GP services

## I need to book an appointment

- During COVID-19 phone or on-line booking systems are the only way to access GP appointments
- · Speak to support staff or an advocacy agency if you have any issues registering
- GP appointments are usually 10 minutes long, but you can always request longer appointments if you need

### I need an interpreter

- If English is not your first language NHS services must provide telephone interpreting services
- You can ask a receptionist or health care provider for an interpreter to help you register and you can also ask for an interpreter for your appointment with the GP or nurse

## Specialist GP practices

- There may be GP practices in your area that are especially for people who are currently homeless or migrants, asylum seekers or refugees
- Advocacy and support services should be able to tell you if there is a specialist GP practice in your area

## Will I be charged?

- Health care provided within a GP surgery is free. However, you may have to pay for prescribed medicines
  depending on what benefits you receive and what health conditions you have. See section below about
  help with health costs.
- If you have no current immigration status or your application is in process you can be charged for hospital care and some community services. See section below about help with health costs.
- If you cannot pay in advance you might not be able to get treated. **However**, if a clinician thinks the treatment is urgent you will be given the treatment. You may receive a bill after treatment. There are some exceptions to this e.g. **treatment related to COVID-19** is free.

#### I need help with the costs of medicines, dental treatment and sight care

- Depending on which benefits you receive and your medical conditions you might also be required to pay for prescriptions, dental care, eye tests and glasses
- However, if you have a low income, you may be eligible for an NHS HC2 certificate which entitles you to free prescriptions, dental treatment, sight tests and vouchers for glasses. If you are not entitled to benefits you can still apply for this.
- An HC1 form is used to apply for this certificate.
- Your health provider should be able to give you an HC1 form. If not, this form can be downloaded from the
  internet. And you can also apply online <a href="https://services.nhsbsa.nhs.uk/apply-for-help-with-nhs-costs/apply-online">https://services.nhsbsa.nhs.uk/apply-for-help-with-nhs-costs/apply-online</a>
- · Ask for help to fill in the form if you need it

### Will my GP share information about me?

- GP practices and other NHS services will NOT share your information with any other Government department
- GP practices do not share information with the Home Office currently
- The only situation in which a GP might have to share information about you is if you are at risk or there is risk to others

# Astounding facts about the human body

- 1. Your body is made of about 7 octillion atoms (that's 7,000,000,000,000,000,000,000,000,000 atoms).

- 5. Cells in the inner lens of the eye, muscle cells of the heart, and the neurons of the cerebral cortex are the only cells that will be with you your entire life.



- 6. If you were to spread out all the wrinkles in your brain, it would be about the size of a pillowcase.
- 7. There are a trillion nerves powering your memory. Studies have shown that after viewing 2,500 images for only 3 seconds, participants could recall if they had seen the images with 92% accuracy.





## Quiz 1 - Longest place names

# 1. Taumatawhakatangihangakoauauotamateaturipukakapikimaungahoronukupokaiwhenuakitanatahu, New Zealand

This is a name of a hill near Porangahau in the southern Hawke's Bay in New Zealand. It is a name given in the Moari language. This hill is 305 meters tall and is famously known for its long name. This name has since been shortened to Taumata for the ease of pronunciation.

The meaning of the name has been translated to mean "the place where Tamatae, the man who had big knees, the climber of mountains, the slider, the land-swallower that travelled about, played the nose flute that he had to the loved ones." With 85 characters, this word, represents the world's longest place name according to the Guinness World Records. This name has other versions which are even longer, but these other versions contain hyphens.

## 2. Llanfairpwllgwyngyllgogerychwyrndrobwllllantysiliogogogoch, Wales

This name is often shortened as Llanfairpwll or Llanfair PG for brevity. It is the name of a large community and village in Wales that live on the Islands of Anglesey. Initially, this community was referred to as Llanfair Pwllgwyngyll before its name was changed in the 19th century to promote it as a tourist attraction centre. In the year 2011, the population of this community was 3040. At 58 characters, Llanfairpwllgwyngyllgogerychwyrndrobwllllantysiliogogogoch is the longest one-word place name in the United Kingdom and the world's second longest place name.

The name was invented in the 1860s for promotional purposes. It was aimed at being a commercial avenue since tourist will be coming to see the community with the world's longest name. The long name has been credited to a local cobbler according to the village's website even though Sir John Morris-Johns, this name was created by a tailor who lived in the locality.

## 3. Chargoggagoggmanchauggagoggchaubunagungamaugg, United States

Chargoggagoggmanchauggagoggchaubunagungamaugg is a lake found in Webster, Massachusetts in the United States. It is also referred to as Lake Webster. This name is from the Nipmuc, which is an Algonquian language. It translates to "fishing point that's at the boundaries and which is a neutral meeting point."

Located near the border of Connecticut, it has a surface area of a 5.84 square kms. The name is made up of 45 letters and is believed to be the longest place

name in the United States, as well as the third longest in the world.

## 4. Tweebuffelsmeteenskootmorsdoodgeskietfontein, South Africa

Tweebuffelsmeteenskootmorsdoodgeskietfontein is a farm located in the North Western Province of South Africa, about 200km to the west of Pretoria. It comes from the Afrikaans language meaning a "spring where two buffaloes were killed by use of one short."

This name is derived from combinations of different languages including German, Afrikaans, and Dutch. Terms from all these languages were put together to come up with the long word. This is made up 44 characters, and its South Africa's longest one-word place and the world's 4th longest place name.

## 5. Azpilicuetagaraycosaroyarenberecolarrea, Spain

At 39 letters, this is the fifth longest name of a place in the world, and the longest both in Spain and Europe. This name has been named from Basque language which has been translated into English to mean "the low field of a high pen of Azpilkueta".

## 6. Äteritsiputeritsipuolilautatsijänkä, Finland

This 35 letter word name is the longest one worded place name in Finland and the second longest in Europe. It is the name of a bog region in Finnish Lapland.

A pub owner registered his premises under this name after being frustrated in his last two attempts of trying to register with other names and failing. He decided on this long name that he knew no one else had. This name though is not Finish as it has no meaning derived from it. It is most likely to be gibberish!

## 7. Pekwachnamaykoskwaskwaypinwanik, Canada

Pekwachnamaykoskwaskwaypinwanik is a lake of the Manitoba. It is the longest one worded place name in Canada. The name is from the Cree language and means a place where fishing hooks are used to catch wild trout.

This lake is located in the north-eastern part of Manitoba near the border with Ontario. At 31 letters long, it is ranked as the seventh longest one-word place name in the world.

## 8. Venkatanarasimharajuvaripeta, India

Venkatanarasimharajuvaripeta is a name of a railway station in Andhra Pradesh located on the border with Tamil Nadu state in India. This railway station is normally distinguished from other railway stations in India as the railway station with the longest name. 'Sri' is a three letter prefix used to refer to this railway station for the sake of ease of pronunciation and brevity.

## 9. Bovenendvankeelafsnysleegte, South Africa

Bovenendvankeelafsnysleegte is a farm that is found in South Africa in the Upper Karoo of Northern Cape Town. It is South Africa's second longest one-word place name, and at 27 letters, it's the world's ninth longest place name. This name is from the Afrikaans language, and it means the "upper end of a throat-cut valley". The farm lies at an altitude of 923 meters height above sea level.

## 10. Mamungkukumpurangkuntjunya Hill, Australia


Mamungkukumpurangkuntjunya is the name of a hill found in South Australia, located approximately 108.8km north-west of the small town of Marla.

At twenty-six letters (the same length as the English alphabet), it is the official longest place name in Australia. This name is derived from the Pitjantjatjara language.


