An action plan was being formulated and put in place to manage the situation and would be monitored through the Access Delivery Group (ADG). It was also agreed that FPC and QSC would consider a further joint workshop to deep dive into the topic to ensure that all impacts were fully assessed.	BAF 3.2

FPC noted a significant amount of work was being carried out through ADG and AFM in terms of 52 week waits and transformation plans.</li> <li>FPC also noted there was improvement in performance of other metrics;</li> <li>9 special cause concerns were reported which was a reduction from 11 reported the previous month.</li> <li>Approximately 50% of the priority service metrics were showing improvement month on month.</li> <li>LD annual health checks completed reported 81.5% at the end of the year against a target of 75%. The number of people on the LD register had increased over the past twelve months, so too had the number of people who had received a health check however, an improvement had been seen each year over the past five years.</li> </ul>	BAF 3.2

LPT would look to the collaborative for one off (non-recurrent) contributions to support the in-year deficit position. Summary of Draft Annual Accounts 2024/25	FPC/25/033	Director of Finance	FPC acknowledged the phenomenal performance of all teams across the Trust to achieve a balanced financial position at the end of 2024/25 and in particular the Finance Team for their continued hard work and dedication to delivering value for the trust. LPT was expected to achieve all of its statutory duties; I&E breakeven, delivery of the external financing limit duty (cash) and capital resource limit duty.  Agency costs had decreased by almost a third, reducing from £31m to £21m since 2023/24.
